The Bachelor of Psychological Science will provide you with a scientific understanding of normal psychological processes such as perception, memory, learning, motivation, biology, personality, emotion, developmental psychology, and social relationships, as well as training in statistical analysis.

Professional outcomes

An undergraduate qualification in psychology can lead to employment opportunities in behaviour management and organisational psychology, as well as in professional areas such as advertising and marketing, research positions, and human resources roles related to recruitment, selection, training, and development. Graduates of the Bachelor of Psychological Science are also eligible to apply for fourth-year psychology programs.

Program description

The Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Bridging) allows students to fast-track a qualification equivalent to a three-year undergraduate sequence in the discipline of psychology. This program is not available to international students who intend to apply for a student visa to undertake this program.

Cognate vs Non-Cognate: What is the difference?

Cognate is for students who have completed an undergraduate psychology qualification, but have not met the entry threshold (GPA requirements) to progress to a fourth-year program. Non-cognate is a pathway designed for students who have completed an undergraduate program in a discipline other than psychology and are looking to transition into postgraduate psychology studies to obtain their professional or clinical registration.

Program description

Bond's Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours) is a fourth-year program designed to provide students with an integrated, comprehensive, and complete education in the discipline of psychology. Students undertake advanced training in a range of methodological and applied areas and develop competence in conducting research. All content is based on the scientist-practitioner model, and evidence-based approaches to psychological intervention are stressed.

Program structure

Entry requirements

Admission to a fourth-year psychology program requires the successful completion of an accredited three-year sequence of study in psychology in Australia or equivalent.

Applicants for the Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours) must have achieved a minimum GPA of 2.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale (or CGPA of 65 to 69 per cent) for all second-level and third-level psychology subjects in their undergraduate studies.

Professional outcomes

Graduates will meet the eligibility to apply for provisional registration as a psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia. Full registration requires an additional two years study in an accredited master's program.

Program description

The Master of Professional Psychology program provides advanced education in the professional practice of psychology. The training is based on a scientist-practitioner model and is designed to prepare students with the knowledge and applied skills required of a registered practising psychologist. The program draws from a range of theoretical perspectives informed by contemporary research and practice. This degree integrates coursework and practical placement experience.

Students complete 300 hours of practicum. This supervised professional experience will occur partly through clinical activities in the Bond University Health and Wellness Clinic (BUHAWC) under staff supervision.

Entry requirements

Entry to the Master of Professional Psychology requires the successful completion of an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited four-year sequence of study in psychology. Approved pathway programs include Bond's Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours), or equivalent. Programs must have been completed within the last 10 years, with a minimum of Lower Second-Class Honours (H2B) or equivalent (GPA of 2.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale or CGPA of 65 per cent to 74 per cent). Applicants are then assessed on academic merit, referee reports, and personal suitability via interview and psychometric testing. Candidates must also be eligible for provisional registration as a Psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia.

Professional outcomes

This program meets the requirements for registration as set out by the Psychology Board of Australia. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates must independently source and undertake an additional year of supervised practice to become eligible to apply for full registration as a psychologist, and for full membership with the Australian Psychology Society (APS).

Students will complete a two-semester internship in the Bond University Health and Wellness Clinic (BUHAWC) under staff supervision and two externships in community settings under external supervision.

*Students may be required to travel outside of the Gold Coast region to undertake external placements. Bond University cannot guarantee the timing of an external placement. Students may need to extend beyond six semesters in order to complete all the necessary components of the program. Students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to and from externship locations.

Entry requirements

Entry to the Master of Psychology (Clinical) requires the successful completion of an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited four-year sequence of study in psychology. Approved pathway programs include Bond's Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours), or equivalent. Programs must have been completed within the last 10 years, with a minimum of Upper Second-Class Honours (H2A) or equivalent (GPA of 3.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale or CGPA of 75 per cent or above). Applicants are then assessed on academic merit, referee reports, and personal suitability via interview and psychometric testing. Candidates must also be eligible for provisional registration as a psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia.

Applications into the Master of Psychology (Clinical) program at Bond University from board-registered psychologists who have successfully completed the Master of Professional Psychology program or a Level 3-accredited APAC psychology program with a Distinction-level GPA are also accepted (75 per cent or above). Applicants will need to submit the same documents as outlined above.

Professional outcomes

This program meets the requirements for registration as set out by the Psychology Board of Australia. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates are eligible to apply for full registration as a psychologist, a board-approved registrar program (for their area of practice endorsement), full membership of the Australian Psychology Society (APS), and associate membership of the corresponding APS Specialist College.

Bond psychology students become first in Australia to be EFT trained

Bond University's Master of Psychology (Clinical) students have become Australia's first to undertake a subject addressing 'psychological acupuncture', also known as EFT training, as part of their degree. Trauma Informed Approaches to Client Care is a coursework subject that the program cohort undertakes in their second year. (CRICOS 063429E)

As a world leader in research and practice for Emotional Freedom Techniques (EFT) for the past 15 years, Dr Peta Stapleton designed and teaches the subject at Bond. EFT involves tapping different acupuncture points on the face or body as a treatment for mental and physical conditions, and the practice has been shown to be incredibly effective in helping people achieve behavioural change and manage negative emotions, such as stress and anxiety.

EFT has been used to help people address eating issues, quit smoking, reduce chronic pain, and improve long-term mental health conditions such as PTSD, anxiety, and depression. A major benefit of the practice is that it allows individuals to feel empowered in their recovery, and reduces their dependence on medication, which often carries a long list of side effects to their health and wellbeing. Bond's Master of Clinical Psychology cohort will undertake the new subject this semester, learning how to apply EFT in their sessions with clients. The only other university in the world currently offering EFT training is in Paris.

"Our students will be able to use the technique with clients when they go into the field on their placements," Dr Stapleton said.

Higher degrees by research (HDR)

Entry requirements

The minimum requirement for PhD candidature is a four-year psychology degree with a GPA of Upper Second-Class Honours (H2A) or equivalent (75 per cent or above). Alternatively, candidates may possess a research master's degree or qualifications deemed to be equivalent to the above by the HDR Committee. Where applicable, students may be asked to commence a Master of Philosophy as a pathway into the full PhD candidature.



Student community

Bond Psychological Society (BPS)

The Bond Psychological Society (BPS) aims to create a community that offers students a sense of belonging and support during their psychology studies at Bond. The BPS also endeavours to provide networking opportunities for both undergraduate and postgraduate students with industry professionals and, in conjunction with the Australian Psychological Society, offer opportunities for professional development and personal growth.



Facilities

Test Library

The Bond University Test Library has an extensive collection of psychological test materials that support the teaching, research, and clinical activities of the School's students and staff.

Dedicated learning spaces

Undergraduate students can participate in studies conducted by our fourth-year and PhD students in our Cognitive Research Labs. At fourth-year and master's level, students have access to a designated and secured study space to analyse data and write up their research findings.



Accreditation

All psychology programs at Bond University specified in this document are accredited with the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and approved by the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA).

Accreditation is renewed every five years. Psychology majors undertaken within degrees not specified within this document are not APAC accredited and as such, do not form part of the accredited sequence of study required to become a registered Psychologist.

Bond University Health and Wellness Clinic

The Bond University Psychology Clinic (BUPC) is a student training facility that has been providing psychological services to the Gold Coast community since 1999. As of January 2024, the Psychology Clinic was incorporated within a broader network of allied health services offered at the Bond Institute of Health and Sport and is now operating as part of the Bond University Health and Wellness Clinic (BUHAWC).

Psychology services are provided by provisionally registered Master of Psychology students under the guidance of qualified supervisors, and cover an extensive range of assessments and interventions for psychological and health-related concerns. BUHAWC is an invaluable asset for postgraduate students, and presents them with an opportunity to work with clients of all ages.

Members of the public are welcome to contact the team at BUHAWC for cognitive and clinical assessments and psychological treatment for individuals, families, children, and adolescents for issues including anxiety, low moods, stress, grief, depression, adjustment disorders, and family and relationship issues. Clients can now also benefit from a range of additional allied health services, including physiotherapy, nutrition and dietetics, and occupational therapy.

Interns work with clients from the community under the supervision of highly experienced and qualified clinical supervisors and academic staff. Supervision and training during these internships utilise a hypothesis testing approach to introduce interns to the practice of evidence-based therapy, in accordance with the tradition of the scientist-practitioner model.

Within this structured and supportive environment, interns cultivate their counselling skills, which are important in the development and maintenance of a therapeutic alliance. They acquire interview skills to gather critical information to conduct initial interviews and formal psychological assessments. This approach to practical training enables students to plan, design, provide and evaluate psychological treatments, and equips them with diverse knowledge of ethical, legal, and professional practice matters.

A tale of two passions: rural education and psychology

"I'm from a small country town out west, where I was originally a high school teacher. Being in the country during the drought, there were a lot of mental health issues and not really any services out there.

I did a bridging programme to move into psychology, and I sort of fell in love with psychology as a discipline and I really like helping people. It's rewarding to see people progress and accept that mental health is important, I really do love it.

While we're in the clinic, we have to, at a minimum, see clients face to face for 120 hours, which is probably the most important part because we get an opportunity to learn on real cases. Getting to work with real clients in the community, we learn a lot better than you would in a classroom. The combination of practical and theoretical makes us a lot more well-rounded, which is great.

We also get real-time support from our supervisors, which is really helpful, especially because if you have a big issue, you can get help straight away.

It is quite a tight and interconnected group at Bond. Everyone gets along really well, and everyone is in the same boat, so it's a very supportive group of people to work and learn with. It's great that we have more psychologists coming through because there's such a need in the industry. People are beginning to understand that physical health and mental health are interconnected and interrelated. They're equally important.

I still love education and working with adolescents and youth, but being from a farm and a small working town, I also have a passion for rural Australia. I also have Indigenous heritage, so I think my ultimate life role would be travelling to rural Australia and working with those vulnerable populations or working in a school, helping kids understand how they think and how they can learn."
